Explanation to Commandments 4-10: “We should fear and love God so that . . .”

Commandments 4-10: “Honor your father and mother. You shall not murder. You shall not commit adultery. You shall not steal. You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. You shall not covet.”

Explanation to Lord’s Prayer, Fifth Petition: “So we too will sincerely forgive and gladly do good to those who sin against us.”

Luther’s Morning Prayer: “. . . that all my doings and life may please you.”

From the Liturgies

Confession of Sin, Divine Services 1 and 2: “We have not loved You with our whole heart; we have not loved our neighbor as ourselves.”

The Lord’s Prayer, Fifth Petition: “And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us.”

Post Communion Collect, All Divine Services: “Strengthen us in the same in faith toward You and in fervent love toward one another;”

Collect for Grace from Matins: “That all our doings, being ordered by Your governance, may be pleasing in Your sight.”

Collect for Peace from Vespers/Evening Prayer: “That our hearts may be set to obey your commandments”
